Resources and its associated boards: Board on Agriculture Assembly, Board on Natural Resources, Board on Oceans and Atmosphere, Board on Human Sciences, and the Board on Veterinary Medicine. He interfaces with the APLU member institutions and the various federal agencies that fund instructional, research, and extension activities. He also works with the Council on Agricultural Research, Extension, and Teaching (CARET), a lay advocacy group supporting the Land-grant system. Ian is also actively engaged with international life science and agricultural higher education organizations. In short, Ian is the man behind the curtains, with his hand in everything that experiment stations are involved with.
