a) Cornerstone Report (COVID-19 and FY2021 Appropriations, Elections) – Hunt, Vernie.

- At the BAC meeting, Cornerstone gave an election report and described scenarios that they saw at the time. The election ambiguity has been resolved since then.
- There is an appropriations agreement on the topline numbers to move forward as an omnibus bill for FY21.
- The CR expires 12/11 and is likely to be extended for the short-term as long as progress on the FY21 omnibus continues, which is also likely and President Trump appears to be willing to sign the bill.
- Cornerstone will be sending out a Call to Action early next week on the omnibus bill, please keep an eye out for it.
- Regarding the fourth COVID-19 relief bill, it's possible we'll see a few high level
 pieces from it (vaccine distribution, unemployment extensions, etc.) added into
 an omnibus. This will take some pressure off the immediate need for another
 relief bill.
- Question from Gary T. on the SCRI match requirement not specifically waived in the new RFP - do we need to deal with this now? Vernie: RFAs are issued on the rules in existence and the SCRI RFA followed these existing rules. Discussion with USDA and others is on-going and they are working on a clarification that makes it clear that the waiver is in place for the length of the current CR. This also applies if the CR is continued. Waiver language is also under consideration for the coming appropriations bills. Gary: More explanation to come from USDA tomorrow in "NIFA notes". Kate F.: The new CR will indeed have more clarity/plain language on the match waiver.

ACTION needed: Discuss and vote on this proposal or alternatives.

- Summary: Proposal provides a 5% increase (just under \$60M) for BAC priority lines (aka Unified Ask), starting FY22. Today, we are voting only on ESCOP's position on this 5% increase. Other sections are considering this now to provide feedback at the December BAC meeting. There was general BAC agreement this month that 5% increase was reasonable. We want to include 1994s in this, but had to show them in three different lines because of how their lines are organized. Not sure if they will sign on, as they may be trying to push for a high %. Presidents at the 1994s decide on their priorities and are meeting mid-Dec. BAA effort will evaluate the near future 1994 positions and potentially adjust further.
- Need to continue to pay attention to our Capacity funds messaging and keep it as strong as that for Competitive funds.
- Stakeholders appreciate the simplicity of this Unified Ask.
- Action Taken: Motion made to approve this 5% proposal by Saied and John seconded.
- Action Taken: Proposal passed as presented by BLC directors.

ACTION needed: Discuss and vote on this proposal or alternatives.

- Summary: Proposal would allow APS to receive new money to reach their full \$40M authorization.
- Action Taken: Saied made a motion of approval for this proposal, Steve seconded it.
- Discussion: Anything we can do to support and improve our STEM classroom efforts also supports research, helps with future recruiting.
- Action Taken: Proposal passed as presented by BLC directors.

5. APLU Update – Doug Steele

- Doug mentioned the BAC Unified Ask (discussed above), Infrastructure advocacy efforts, and the APS proposal (also discussed above) and how they illustrate APLU's efforts to seek out opportunities of the moment and make sure to get momentum behind them.
- Infrastructure and strategic realignment implementation efforts are moving forward.
- Capacity Fund Value messaging efforts happening behind the scenes, preparing for the right time to push this effort forward.
- Also, APLU is paying attention to President Elect Biden's new appointments for next year, see Caron's link pasted below for details. Jeff thanked APLU, especially Doug Steele, for sharing this and their efforts with the transition.


